Call for Late-Breaking Abstracts

Deadline: February 9th, 2024

The 2024 Annual Scientific Meeting (ASM) of the Canadian Pain Society (CPS), organized in partnership with Health Canada, will create a forum in which scientists, healthcare professionals, people with lived experience of pain, trainees and policy makers from clinical, educational, research, policy, industry, and other settings can meet and exchange up-to-date information on pain mechanisms, assessment, and management.

The Scientific Program Committee (SPC) seeks to offer a balanced, diverse, and cutting-edge program that reflects different areas of pain science and policy from all members of the pain community.

Your participation is of the utmost importance and will be integral for the success of the CPS Annual Scientific Meeting and continued progress in pain research and management.

Submission Guidelines

All abstracts must be submitted through the CPS abstract submission portal. Submissions and subsequent posters/presentations will be accepted in both English and/or French. CPS members and non-members are eligible to submit their work as a poster presentation. Notification regarding the acceptance of abstracts will be conveyed to submitting authors by early March.

Canadian Journal of Pain

Accepted abstracts will be printed in the online *Canadian Journal of Pain*, published by Taylor and Francis, and will be available for online viewing before and during the 2024 Annual Scientific Meeting. The *Journal* may not consider your abstract for publication if information from the abstract is missing. **Please have all co-authors check and edit your submission carefully, including authorship details, as the submitted version will be the final version for publication.** Please ensure that authors' names and affiliations are accurate.
